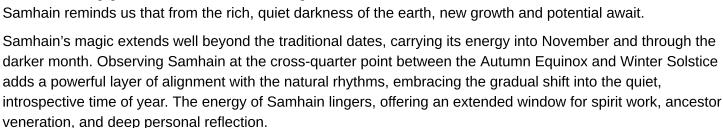

This time can be deeply transformative, especially when we actively participate in practices like ancestor veneration, ritualized letting-go, and the mindful welcoming of winter.



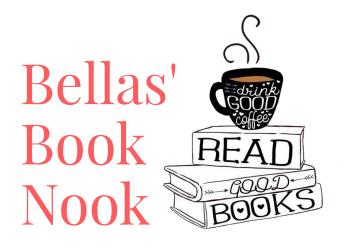
The following ideas form small magics for November! Each one aligns perfectly with the energy of autumn, promoting comfort, protection, and clarity as you prepare for winter.

This is the second part of a challenge issued to me, to give an honest opinion of this book. For the most part, I actually did enjoy reading, Dreaming the God. Some stories are delightful and easy to read, especially the first story by Glenn Bresciani. It's a twist on the story of Persephone and Hades, and how his well-made plan, bites him back.

Our own Ross W. Carter's contribution, The Language of the Sky, was quite thought provoking. It reminded me of the tales of how sea-farers landing on foreign shore, taught and learned from others, in order to survive. However, this story went deeper, in the sense that sometimes, ordinary beings, are Godsends in their own right. That the actions of people, different from ourselves, can enlighten, educate, and elevate in wonderful ways.

James Dick's story, Between Fire and Infinity, reads like a cold-war spy novel from the early 70's, complete with warring Gods, and would probably turn out to be a great Sci-fi movie. The Last Gasp of War by L.A. Selby, along with Jeff Provine's - The Weather War, are two stories that would probably wind up as afternoon B-rated - made for TV movie, perfect for a rainy or snowy afternoon.

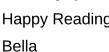
The final story by Ralph Mack entitled, Dawn of Spring, reminded me of a series of books about life in a coven called Coven Crafting, (but that review, I'll save for another time.) It's a beautiful story of life within a coven at a convention and the issues, and personalities and characters that unexpectedly fill your life.

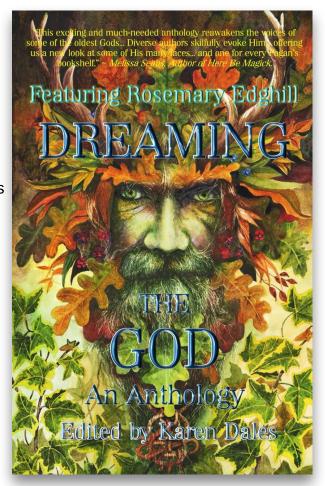

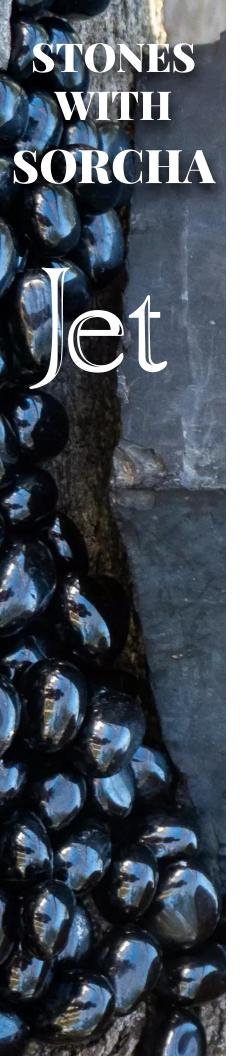

Jet, also sometimes known as Lignite (type of coal), Black Amber or the Witch's Stone, has an organic origin having been created through decaying wood under extreme pressure. It comes from the wood from a family of Araucariaceae trees which are an ancient group of cone-bearing trees that existed during the Jurassic and Cretaceous periods. There are two forms of Jet; hard and soft. Soft Jet occurs when carbon is compressed with freshwater, while hard Jet forms with compressed carbon and saltwater. Technically, it is not a mineral, but a Mineraloid, a naturally occurring substance that seems like a mineral, but does not exhibit structural crystals. It is most commonly black in colour, but has also been found in deep tones of brown

Since the Bronze Age, if not before, Jet from Yorkshire and beyond has been fashioned into ornaments and jewelry. It's been found amongst gravesites and burials for thousands of years, as it was thought to protect the bones and soul in the afterlife. It became popular when Queen Victoria wore it after the death of Prince Albert, her wearing a carving of it as a charm on her dress during her mourning. During the Middle Ages, Jet was carved into images of beetles and worn for protection. Sea witches and fishermen's wives in old Britain prized Jet as a potent magical protectant, and they would burn it in the household fires to guard their absent husbands.

As Jet is essentially coal, you should not use water or sunlight to cleanse or charge it. Instead, bury it in Earth or sea salt overnight to clear any unwanted energies that it may have absorbed. As it is extra effective at absorbing negative energies, it is suggested to cleanse and charge Jet regularly. When rubbed, Jet has the power to electrify and enhance its capabilities.

Magical Uses

Jet is receptive, therefore being an excellent stone for absorbing and dispelling negative and baneful energies, a very protective stone. You may wear it to dispel fearfulness and to protect yourself from illness and violence. Placed in the home, it will protect from negativity. You can place small shavings of it in a glass bottle, fill with distilled water, and set it in the sunlight till the water warms. Filter out the jet, and then drink the liquid just prior to divination practices. Place jet upon your altar, or wear a piece of it during health and healing spells as it helps to maintain proper energy flow within the body, promoting good health. The stone will help ease an old animal into death, protecting them on their journey into the afterlife. Jet is used as a doorway into other dimensions, especially the past. Many users find that Jet aids in the exploration of the subconscious mind, uncovering hidden truths and facilitating personal growth when used in relative spellwork.

Healing Uses

Jet is an excellent stone for skin irritations, bites and stings, toothaches, migraines, gastrointestinal pains, and colds. Psychologically, it guards against nightmares and anxiety. Jet has been known to help people get in touch with their own energy and adapt it to their daily life. Jet is a wonderful stone for us to wear at any time, but even moreso at this time of the thinning veil. As we travel amongst the realms, using our scrying tools to divine our little hearts out, we can utilize it to protect us on our journeys on the Astral, and channelling of old departed souls and spirit. Get out those tarot decks and crystal balls, rēad those tea leaves and coffee grounds, but don't forget your Jet! May the blessings of your ancestors be bestowed upon you. Blessed Samhain!

Rosemary

Herb Lore with Glenys



Once again, the wheel turns, and we find ourselves in the middle of the waning light. It is Samhain and we start to focus on our own thoughts and remembering those that have passed. Divination is frequent practice at this time of year, and we seek herbs to help us focus. Rosemary, Salvia rosmarinus, formerly Rosmarinus officianalisis one such herb. Some folk names are Compass Weed, Dew of the Sea, Mary's Rose, Elf Leaf, Guardrobe, Incensier, Polar plant and Sea Dew

Rosemary is a member of the Sage (Salvia) genus of the Lamiaceae family which includes mint, deadnettle (Lamia) as well as the aforementioned sage. Most of the plants in this family are aromatic and particularly useful in cooking as well as medicinally. Because of its aromatic nature it is pest resistant and is often used to keep insects at bay.

Rosemary is native to the Mediterranean but is readily available fresh, dried, or live, as an indoor potted plant. Rosemary is an evergreen shrub with short needles similar to spruce. It is drought tolerant and can withstand cool climates. The flowers can range in colour from white through pink, purple and blue. Rosemary is an ancient plant and the first documented in cuneiform on stone tablets from 5000 BCE. Romans, Greeks, and Egyptians considered rosemary a sacred plant. There is a reference to rosemary in Pedanius Dioscorides' *De Materia Medica*

Rosemary needles are a common ingredient in many savoury dishes, especially in stuffings, meat garnishment and sauces. The leaves of Rosemary make an excellent herbal tea. Oil of Rosemary has many applications. Rosemary has antimicrobial (antibacterial, antiviral, and antifungal) properties. The oil can be used in a variety of applications such as cleaning, bath and body products and diffusers.

Medicinally, rosemary improves circulation and can aid in preventing hair loss by stimulating the scalp and can stimulate the nerve function to promote healing and growth. As a natural anti-inflammatory it also can heal skin and clear up blemishes. Inhaling rosemary can reduce stress. It also aids in boosting concentration and focusing on the task at hand. Many use rosemary to reduce pain and inflammation. Rosemary also promotes healthy digestion. Because of Rosemary's properties, it has the ability to lower the risk of type 2 diabetes, liver issues and the risk of blood clots.

Rosemary has many magical applications. Rosemary is a masculine plant. It is associated with the Sun, the astrological sign of Leo and the element of fire. Rosemary is an herb of protection, love, purification, healing, remembrance, and mental concentration. It is also a funerary herb and was one of the ingredients the Egyptians used in embalming their dead. It is an ingredient in many incenses.

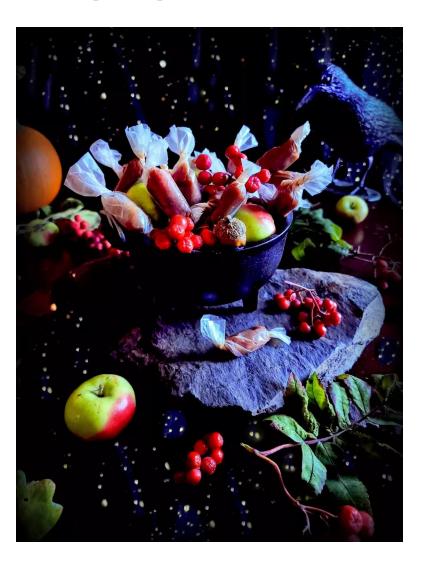
Many cultures use rosemary in wedding wreaths and bouquets to promote love, fidelity, loyalty, remembrance, and protection.

Sleeping with a sprig of rosemary under your pillow will aid sleep and drive away nightmares and memories. Burning rosemary as an incense will purify the surroundings and repel negative forces. It aids in concentration, memory, and divinatory practices. Drinking rosemary tea will also aid in concentration, memory, and divination..

The Sabbat Table

Rowan Berry Caramels

(Recipe excerpted from The Season Of Harvest Ecookbook at Gather Victoria Patreon)



INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup of rowan berries
- ½ cup salted butter, cut into slices
- 1 cup honey
- 1 cup whipping cream
- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- coarse sea salt, for sprinkling
- 1. In a saucepan, bring the rowan berries to a low simmer to soften them and release their juices. Pour into a sieve over a bowl and press the berries through to extract as much of the juice as possible. Discard the seeds. You should end up with just under a ¼ cup of puree. Set aside.
- 2. Place parchment paper into an 8×8-inch baking dish and grease with butter or oil.
- 3. In a large saucepan over medium heat, melt the butter. Add in the honey, heavy cream, and brown sugar and whisk to combine. Remove from the heat and attach a candy thermometer to the side of the pan, making sure the tip of the thermometer isn't touching the bottom of the pan. Slowly pour the rowan berry mixture into the mixture and gently combine.
- 4. Return the pot to medium-high heat. Once the mixture is bubbling, reduce the heat just a tad and let simmer for 20-30 minutes, whisking constantly, until the mixture reaches a temperature of 250 degrees F (121 degrees C). Remove it from the heat and quickly whisk in the vanilla extract.
- 5. Pour the mixture into the prepared pan and allow it to set at room temperature for at least a couple of hours, preferably overnight.
- 6. When the caramels have set, lift them out of the pan by the parchment paper. Place them on a cutting board and cut them into rectangles with a sharp knife. Sprinkle the caramels with the sea salt and wrap them in wax paper). Place the caramels in containers between layers of parchment paper to store. You can also freeze these caramels.

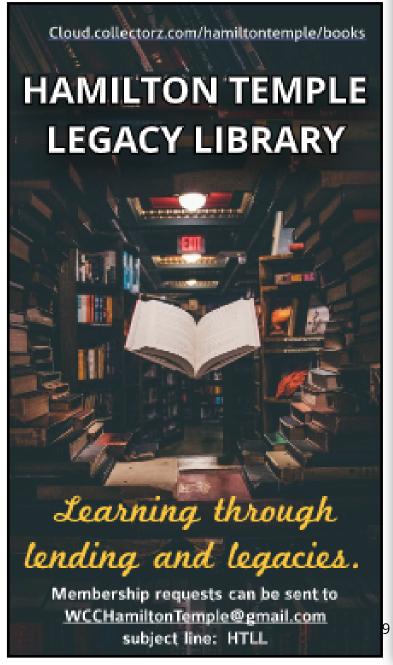

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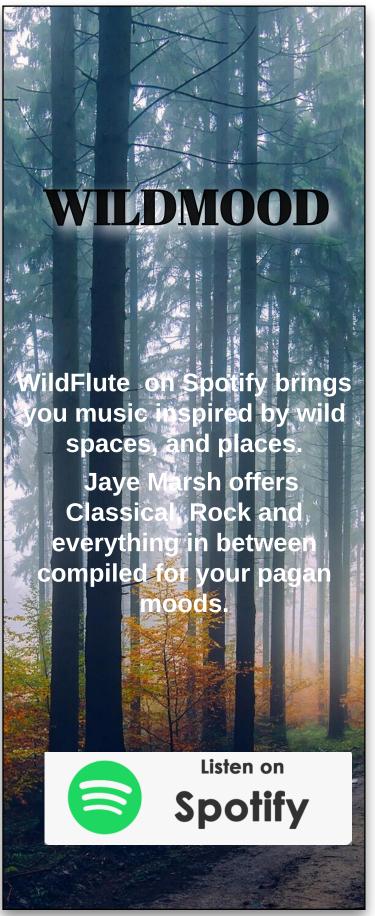
