When Sword & Chalice offered its first newsletter in 2010, it was a 2 sided single page print out from my desk that found its way to coffee shop counters, community bulletin boards and into WCC members pockets after a sabbat. October 2019 brought the next evolution of our newsletter back into circulation – more local pagans looking for more connections! This time Hamilton Temples Sword & Chalice opened the forum to more contributors, more voices from our community - all willing to share skills, interests, and knowledge. We wanted to reach out to local vendors, merchants and pagan services; supporting their workshops and wares.

Coming online allowed Sword & Chalice to promote community, and to broaden opportunities for local pagans. It allows us to share common experiences and support each other in our areas. Bringing back our Herb witch got us back in touch with nature and its magic. While our book reviews give us the opportunity to bring you more resources, and feedback on some of the best pagan books on the shelves - plus even a few hard-to-find gems. Another member is a wizard in the kitchen, became our temples' most popular cook and agreed to share some of his favourite seasonal recipes. Something that we could each bring to our own table, from local farms and fields. And so, we continued – offering connections and shared interests.

With the onslaught of Covid-19 and the closing of so many doors, Sword & Chalice received requests to broaden our circle. To be more inclusive of all our WCC temples and make it relevant to everyone. The Wheel of the Year

In our pagan wheel of the year we observe the arrival of Winter Solstice and like many cultures, we celebrate with Light. As the winter solstice sits between an Ending (Samhain) and a Beginning (Imbolc), it is a natural time for us to become reflective and re-focused. We are in the initial stage of change, a natural time for letting go and

saying farewell to the old and leaving regrets behind. Samhain gave us closure, while Yule celebrates the returning spark of life and reminds us that the future can be bright, we knowingly put stock in the rebirth that Imbolc brings.

Our faith and reverence in bringing the light into our windows, our hearths and ourselves is an age old response to holding the cold dark at bay. We tell our stories of survival, of light triumphing over darkness and we connect with each other through sharing that light and hope.

Many pagans see this time as an opportunity to celebrate the rebirth of a Great God, who is seen as the newborn solstice sun. Winter-born gods are celebrated through-out many cultures, often sharing a re-occurring theme of rebirth and the return of Light. Most of the customs, symbols, and rituals associated with this time of the year mesh joyfully with other spiritual cultures - Christmas, Hanukkah, Yule etc. No matter the myth or miracles' origin, pagans today can themselves bring Light to life by sharing and re-creating new traditions that draw on old ways, through rituals, feasts, and other activities. Do the things that bring you joy and enjoy yourself as much as possible on the Winter Solstice, this will bring back light (and laughter) into the world. Different traditions mention feasting, gambling, giving gifts, visiting, putting on plays and staying up all night, all relevant to knitting the community tighter.

During the dark of winter, lets invoke all the forces of pleasure and love which make life worth living. Before you know it, the slow heating of the earth begins from within, and Imbolc will welcome us from a seat of power, that deep place between the glory of Yule and the joyous madness of Ostara ... The turning of the wheel is upon us; let us reflect and rejoice in the beauty of celebrating our Light.



Bloodstone, also known as Heliotrope, is a combination of Jasper and a Chalcedony variety of Quartz and may be classified as one or the other. It is normally defined as a dark green Chalcedony with blood-like specks or spots of red.

In ancient times, it was saw to be a semi-precious stone, being used extensively in signets and seals, jewelry, and was carved into ornate cups, vases, and statues. Ancient and medieval writers and creators held Heliotrope (Bloodstone) in the highest regard, declaring that it gave the wearer a long, mentally stable life, and bringing the wearer consideration, respect, fame, and guarded that person from deceptions. The Leyden papyrus in the 3rd century A.D. praised the Bloodstone amulet saying, "The world has no greater thing; if one has this with him he will be given whatever he asks for. It also assuages the wrath of kings and despots, and whatever the wearer says will be believed." It also claims, "Whoever bears this stone, and pronounces the name engraved upon it, will find all doors open, while bonds and stone walls will be rent asunder."

Magical Uses

A quite popular stone with athletes, they will wear it to increase physical stamina and strength, and to help them win competitions. Carry or wear a Bloodstone when attending judicial and legal proceedings as it may aid in securing a victory. It attracts abundance and wealth to the wearer and oft times it will be placed within a business' cash drawer to draw sales in. Wear a talisman of bloodstone to increase the effectiveness of your magical workings. In the workplace, it is beneficial against mental and physical drain, and will support you emotionally and physically from bullies. Use Bloodstone in Goddess rituals and for exploring past lives and dream work.

Healing Uses

Bloodstone is a wonderful purifier and cleanser of both the blood and whole system. It is especially beneficial for the digestive and urinary tracts, more so the liver, kidneys, intestines, and will help you stay on course if you're beginning a detox programme or diet. An excellent female stone, Bloodstone aids in relief of menstrual and menopausal symptoms, and helps women keep their strength during labour. It can be beneficial when used for blood circulation and purification, and aids the lymphatic system in functioning properly. It is an amazing emotional healer and carries a great power to ground one in the "here and now", aiding us in our capacities to function with strength, determination, and courage. Bloodstone helps us connect with the Divine; letting us know that isolation and loneliness are simply mere illusions. For those that are severely ill, it is an excellent talisman for facing the realities of mortality and death, and will bring us the strength and courage to look at the truth, and to move forward appropriately.

Bloodstone was known in the ancient world as Heliotrope, from two Greeks words signifying "sun-turning". At this time of the Equinox we see the shift from the longest night, to the rebirth of the Sun, the God. As the dark half of the year relinquishes to the growing days, we celebrate the rebirth of the Oak King, the giver of Life that warms the Earth. Using Bloodstone in our sacred and celebratory rites at this time inspires us to look forward to the longer days ahead, getting our creative juices flowing for our plans of the oncoming season. Crush some up with your mortar and pestle, mix it with the fiery herbs of cinnamon and basil and toss it upon the licking flames of your Yule bonfires to celebrate the return of the light!



The Sabbat Table Moon Cookies

This delicous seasonal treat is surprisingly easy to make. Moon Cookies or Moon Spell Cookies are treats made any Wheel of the Year celebrations and changing of the seasons.

Directions

- Cream together butter and sugar until fluffy and light.
- Add grated lemon peel, salt, flour, grated almonds, and 1 tsp. vanilla; mix thoroughly.
- Place dough in bowl. Cover and chill thoroughly.
- When the dough is well chilled; or the next day, roll out dough to 1/8" thickness and cut with moon/crescent cookie cutter.
- Place 1/2" apart on un-greased baking sheet.
- Bake in preheated 375° oven for 8-10 minutes.

Icing:

- While cookies bake, combine confectioner's sugar, vanilla and water.
- Spread over the tops of cookies while still warm, but not too hot, as icing will melt.
- Thin with additional drops of water if glaze is too thick.
- Allow cookies to cool.

Ingredient Checklist

- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. grated lemon peel
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 1/3 cup flour
- 1 1/2 cup grated almonds (blanched)
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Icing:
- 2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 Tbsp. water

Yield: 10 dozen cookies


Kitchen witchery add ins:

Love - Add a few pinches of rosemary, sweet basil, cinnamon, and honey.

Prosperity - Add cinnamon, nutmeg, basil, and grated lemon peel.

Protection - Add cloves, rosemary, anise, and cinnamon.

Psychic Ability - Add star anise, nutmeg, orange, and thyme.



As we look to The WInter Solstice/Yuletide, we will light candles and celebrate Long Night. We will rejoice that, the days will slowly, get longer, a few seconds at a time. Some people relish the cold wintery days, and hibernate with a few good books. Other folks, enjoy the crispness of the cold air and the brighter blue sky.

While on a grand adventure, I discovered a boutique book shop. To my delight, the shop had several Wiccan-esque books. As I love my lattes, I just about howled with laughter as I stumbled upon a book, entitled, **Coffee Magic**

for the Modern Witch, by Elsie Wild. ISBN: 978-1-64604-550-1. Ulysses Press, Berkeley, California, 2023. It's 190 pages of coffee magic, which includes magical and health properties, associations, and in some instances Medical Warnings. Coffee rituals are also written with milk alternatives. According to the author, Coffee contains all four elements, and states that: Earth, where the beans are from; Fire, which roasts the beans; Water, which is poured over the grounds to create coffee; and Air, which represents the steam from a fresh, hot cup. Each type of coffee has its own magic, and the way it is brewed brings out different qualities. Needless to say, it's a wonderful new addition my collection, and yes, I'll be adding chocolate...but, you'll have to figure out why. Available at Indigo for \$24.95, plus taxes.

The second book, is seasonally appropriate, and is entitled, Pagan Christmas – The Plants, Spirits, and Rituals at the Origins of Yuletide. It's by Christian Ratsch and Claudia Muller-Ebeling, published in 2003. Translated copyright in 2006, by Inner Traditions International, Rochester, Vermont. ISBN: 978-1-59477-092-0. Including the Index, it sits at 213 pages. This book is an absolutely amazing book has 13 chapters plus a bibliography and index for cross-referencing, with everything to do with the history and traditions that surround Yuletide. This would include, but not limited to, a full explanation of the Christmas Calendar, (which begins on November 11, - St. Martin's Day, the first slaughter feast after Samhain,) poetry, songs, crafts, smudges and incense blends, the significance of various flowers associated with the time period, and the list goes on and on. If Yuletide/Winter Solstice is your favourite time of the year, you might consider this for your collection. Available at Indigo for \$34.95, not including taxes.

And finally, while I was on my usual hunt for interesting books, I came across, Earth Magic – Elements of Witchcraft by Dodie Graham McKay, published in 2021 by Llewellyn Books. ISBN: 978-0-7387-6432-0. To say it was fascinating, is an understatement. Divided into 3 sections, and is filled with mythological Earth creatures, various Earth Goddesses, (the Invocation to the Cailleach by Angela Grey is beautiful.) Honouring Earth Gods and building shrines, Earths herbs and botanicals, sacred sites, crystals, how to connect to the land, and basically, the works! Chapter 11, contain Earth Rituals and spells; while Chapter 12 is filled with recipes for celebration on the Wheel of the year. I highly recommend that if you find this book, you re-read Chapter 9 on a regular basis. The advice is sound. In case you're wondering, the author is Indigenous and was the Canadian Correspondent for the Wild Hunt. So, you may also want to check out what else she has done. With the index, it has 209 pages, and is available at Indigo Books for \$26.95.

Mistletoe

Herb Lore with



With another turn of the wheel, Yule has arrived with its myriads of traditions, some ancient and some more modern. Although real mistletoe is hard to find outside of Europe, we still cling to the tradition of kissing under the mistetoe by using artificial replicas

European Mistletoe (Viscum alba) is the most common variety of mistletoe and belongs to the Santalaceae or Sandalwood family. It is ahemiparasiticplant that derives most of its nutrients from its host plants but does contain chlorophyll and can produce some of its own food. Although, most people associate mistletoe with the Oak tree, it can be found on a variety of trees through the British Isles and Much of Europe.

Although the European Mistletoe is the original identified species, the name Mistletoe has been applied to similar plants in other genera of the Santalaceae

including Misoden drum and Loranthaceae.

Mistletoe species can be found throughout the world except in the coldest climates. The American or Eastern Mistletoe (Phoradendronleucarpum) can be used as a substitute for European mistletoe. It is found in temperate regions of North America

Mistletoes are spread by birds that eat the berries and then deposit the seeds on the branches of trees. Depending on the bird and/or species of mistletoe it can be deposited via regurgitation, bird droppings or from the birds wiping their beaks on the branches or leaves of the tree. The seeds are coated in a sticky substance that will harden on the branch and allow the seed to germinate.

Mistletoes are evergreen plants. The European Mistletoe has smooth edged oval leaves found in pairs on a woody stem. The berries are white and waxy. They appear in small clusters of two to six berries.

Mistletoe features prominently throughout history including Roman and Norse mythology as well as the use for medicinal purposes in Greek and Roman cultures.

Medicinally, mistletoe has been used to treat various illnesses including diabetes, seizures, cardiac issues, and cancer. Note that all parts of the mistletoe are toxic and should not be ingested without being prescribed by a certified medical practitioner.

Magically, mistletoe is considered both feminine and masculine. The green leaves representing the fertility of the Goddess and the white berries representing the male aspect, specifically the semen of the God. It is associated with the sun and the element of air. It is associated with the Gods Apollo, Venus, Frey, Odin and Balder.

Mistletoe is believed to offer protection especially against lightning and fires, provide luck, and can be used to attract love. It can be used in spells related to forgiveness and reconciliation. It can banish negativity and unwanted spirits as well as nightmares. It has been used to protect children from thefae.

So, where does the tradition of kissing under the Mistletoe at Christmas come from? Its roots are found in the Roman Festival of Saturnalia. In Victorian times, where public displays of affection were to be avoided, standing under the mistletoe was an invitation to be kissed.


